A displaced homemaker is generally a person who previously provided unpaid services to the family (e.g., a stay-at-home mom or dad), is no longer supported by the husband or wife, is unemployed or underemployed, and is having trouble finding or upgrading employment. If a person quits work, generally they are not considered a dislocated worker even if, for example, the person is receiving unemployment benefits. Note that the SU Financial Aid Office may require you to provide a copy of the determination if you answered "**Yes**" to one of these questions.
